

CoSA was funded by the Government of Canada for 15 years, starting in 2000. Its annual budget has never exceeded \$2 million, compared to the \$5 billion the Canadian government spends yearly on jails and prisaons. Moreover, the public and private costs of a single serious sexual assault have been estimated by Public Safety Canada as being several hundred thousand dollars.

Cycling across Canada is a life's dream for many cyclists, a dream that had dogged me for years. Every spring as the snow melted I'd wonder: "is this the year that I'll do ie?". But life has had it's way of throwing obstacles at me when I'd try to take off for three months.

Nevertheless, this summer I decided to live the dream. The plan was to ride to Newfoundland, fly to Vancouver and ride back home. A coast-to-coast 7000 km ride using only one flight. I loaded my tent, floor mat, sleeping bag, light cooking gear, clothing, repair took and my trusty drone on my road bike. She/it now weighed 35 kilograms. Never before had I done a single day of cycling with so much gear in tow. Just before I left, I removed my odometer as I did not want to be bothered by my speed - the important thing here was to enjoy the ride without feeling the need to perform.

Experts' Open Letter in Response to a Recent CBC Article

On September 15, 2022 a CBC article claimed that "experts" support handing out "longer jail sentences" in order to reduce rime and respond to "profilic offenders". As experts in criminologs, sociologs, and law we feel it is our obligation to clearly and decisively reject this assertion. Decades of research from Canada and comparable jurisdictions like the United States, United Kingdom and Australia has shown that longer prison sentences do not reduce crime.

It was March 13th, and the soft snow on the side of Mount Royal had hardened into an icy hard ground-covering. A small group of folks were gathering there for one purpose: to remember long-time Communitas member Douglas Barnes. Doug passed away quietly on January 7th.

The group was led by an extremely sympathetic Elder, Tom Dearhouse from Kahnawake, forming a circle around a fire burning in the center. The people, most of whom had not known each other before, then began, one by one, to share their memory of Doug and what they knew of him. They were often very

different, from his love of cars to his love of children, to art etc. Several mentioned his reliability as an excellent worker. The gathering included family, co-workers, and Communitas members.

Doug was somewhat of a legend, a longterm prisoner who used his time inside to develop his artwork. Many of us had seen evidence of this on visits to the La Macaza or on the Communitas office walls. It was for all of us to discover that there were many other aspects to Doug.
